Flash Flood Risk

Northeast

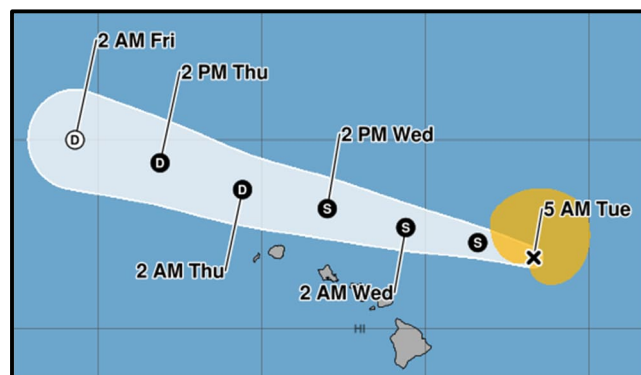
- The FOX Forecast Center is monitoring a potential multiday flood threat beginning Tuesday that covers about 36 million people across parts of the Interstate 95 corridor in the Northeast, including New York City, Philadelphia and Baltimore.
- Depending on how the weather pattern sets up, a second storm could develop off the coast Wednesday, bringing additional rounds of heavy rain to the region and shifting the bull's-eye of the flood threat into New England.
- An area of low pressure is expected to strengthen as it moves out of the Great Lakes on Tuesday, producing widespread thunderstorms along a cold front stretching across the Appalachians.
- While most of the rain associated with the low pressure will remain sub-severe, the incredible amount of moisture in the atmosphere will make for higher rain rates.
- NOAA's Weather Prediction Center (WPC) has issued a Level 3 out of 4 risk of flash flooding across parts of the Lower Hudson Valley, Northern New Jersey, southwestern Connecticut and New York City.
- A broader Level 2 threat covers parts of southern New England, New York's Capital Region, the Catskills, Eastern Pennsylvania and the northern Mid-Atlantic, including Philadelphia and Baltimore.
- Strong wind gusts up to 40 mph are expected in coastal areas beginning Tuesday afternoon.



Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific

Tropical Storm Fausto

- Located 340 miles ENE of Hilo, Hawaii moving WNW at 15 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds of 65 mph.
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 140 miles.
- Additional weakening is forecast during the next several days.
- Surf generated by Fausto will continue to build westward across Hawaii along exposed east-facing shores through today.



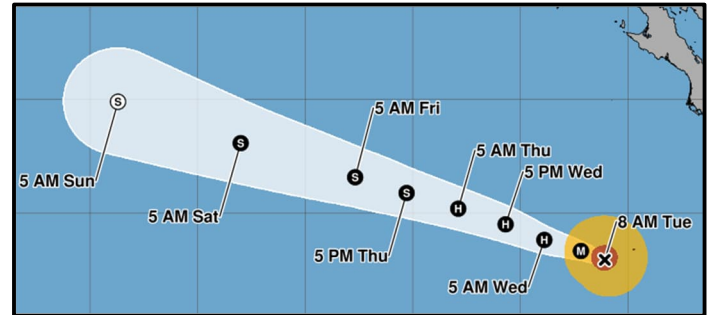
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Hurricane Genevieve (CAT 4)

- Located 515 miles SW of the southern tip of Baja California moving NW at 10 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds of 140 mph.
- Hurricane-force winds extend outward up to 45 miles.
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 175 miles.
- Steady weakening is forecast over the next several days.
