

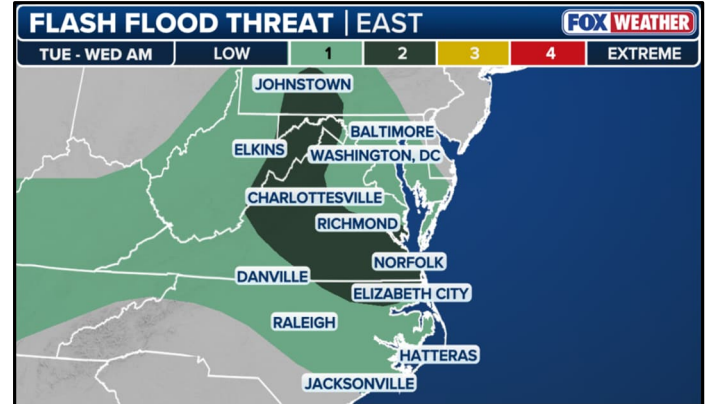

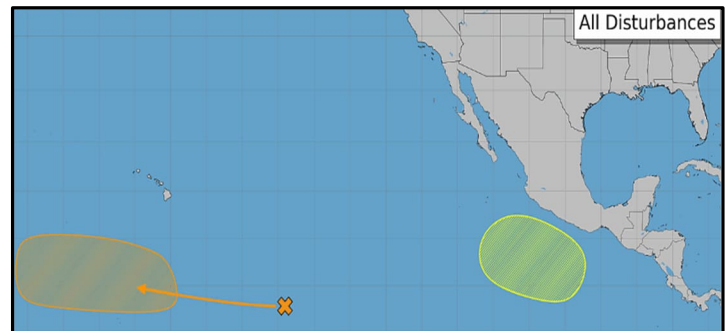
Flash Flood Threat Eastern U.S.

- Millions across New England, the Mid-Atlantic and parts of the Appalachians are under a flash flood threat Tuesday.
- A slow-moving front continues to sag south after inundating parts of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Coastal Connecticut, Rhode Island and the New York City metro area on Monday.
- A slow-moving weather system stretching from Ohio to northern Virginia will bring more rounds of rain, with the heaviest concentration likely over an area from southern Pennsylvania into Virginia, where flood watches remain in effect.
- NOAA's Weather Prediction Center has issued a Level 2 out of 4 flash flood threat for this area through Wednesday morning.
- Farther south, thunderstorms are expected to develop Tuesday afternoon across the Mid-Atlantic and Carolinas, with damaging wind gusts as the primary hazard.
- These storms could also increase the flash flood risk for parts far eastern West Virginia and Virginia.



Tropical Activity – Pacific Disturbance 1

- A developing area of low pressure located well to the southeast of the Hawaiian Islands.
- Environmental conditions appear favorable for additional development later this week into the weekend.
- Moving westward to west-northwestward across the central Pacific remaining south of the Hawaiian Islands.
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (10%)
- Formation chance through 7 days: Med (40%)



Disturbance 2

- A low-pressure system is expected to form late this weekend or early next week several hundred miles south of the coast of southwestern Mexico.
- Gradual development is possible after that time as the system moves west northwestward.
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (0%)
- Formation chance through 7 days: Low (30%)

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Tropical Activity – Western Pacific

Typhoon Bavi

- Typhoon Bavi has downgraded to Category 4 and continues to move away from the Marianas.
- Super Typhoon Bavi made landfall as a strong Category 5 storm over Rota on the morning of July 6, with maximum sustained winds of approximately 180 mph on Rota and up to 90 mph on Tinian and Saipan.
- The island, which is home to about 1,900 people, stayed in the eyewall for more than an hour.
- Tens of thousands of people were left without electricity in Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands.
- The Governor declared the “All Clear” for Saipan, Tinian, and Rota on July 7.
