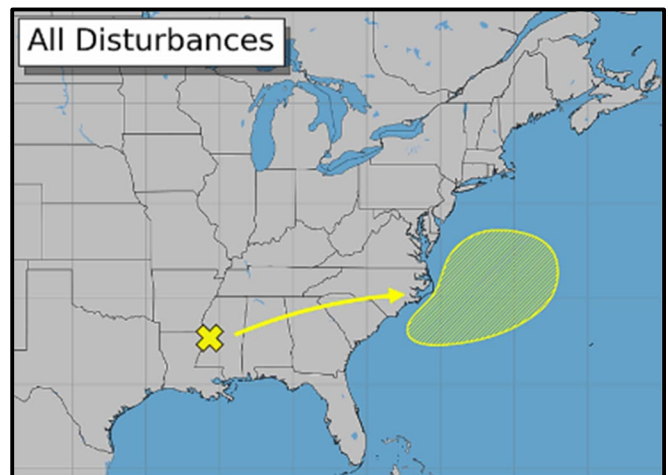
Severe Storm Threat Eastern U.S.

- A line of severe storms is expected to slam the Northeast after a week of pleasant temperatures and sunshine across portions of the region.
- A Level 2 out of 5 severe weather risk is in place from New York City to Pittsburgh, but the exact timing of the storms remains uncertain.
- This threat extends over 1,000 miles from northern Tennessee through western Maine.
- According to the FOX Forecast Center, cooling air will allow for discrete storms capable of producing large and damaging hail.
- Locations facing the greatest risk of these storms on Thursday include Washington, D.C., New York City and Philadelphia.
- As the persistent heavy rainfall continues, it will fuel a Level 2 out of 4 flash flood risk across portions of the Ohio Valley, West Virginia and Western Pennsylvania.



Tropical Activity – Atlantic Post-Tropical Storm Arthur

- The first named storm of the 2026 Atlantic hurricane season has weakened after making landfall along the upper Texas coast.
- According to the National Hurricane Center's early Thursday morning update, Post-Tropical Cyclone Arthur was centered about 30 miles north-northeast of Galveston, Texas, and moving northeast at approximately 8 mph.
- Arthur's maximum sustained winds have decreased to approximately 35 mph, with gusts in the 46-mph range, and its minimum central pressure was estimated at 1000 mb.
- Post-Tropical Storm Arthur is now unleashing potentially catastrophic and life-threatening flooding throughout the South, as days of heavy rain will slam communities in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama.
- A Level 4 out of 4 flash flood threat has been issued for Thursday and a Level 3 out of 4 risk for Friday in the Southeast U.S., where widespread rain and catastrophic flooding are possible.



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- Locations with a high flood risk include Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Jackson, Mississippi; Montgomery, Alabama; and Atlanta.
- Overall, widespread rainfall could total 5 to 8 inches across Southern Texas to Alabama, with 8 to 12 inches possible in portions of Louisiana, which could result in deadly flash flooding.
- Outside of the flash flood risk, there is a lingering Level 2 out of 5 severe storm threat across coastal Mississippi and into Southern Alabama, where tornadoes are possible.
- As the remnants of Arthur move toward the Carolinas, rounds of persistent rain will kick off on Thursday and last well into Friday, but there is uncertainty about when exactly the heaviest rain will fall.
- As this mid-level spin moves offshore, it will hover over the warm waters of the Gulf Stream.
- At this point on Friday, a new area of low pressure could form, bringing gusty winds and heavy rain to coastal regions along the East Coast.
- This is unlikely to be a tropical threat, but it is worth monitoring amid potential development in the coming days.

Tropical Activity – Western Pacific

Invest 92W

- Located 224 miles ESE of Guam, moving WNW at 10 mph.
- Forecast to pass through CNMI/Guam later this week.
- Tropical development is likely but expected to occur beyond 24 hours
