

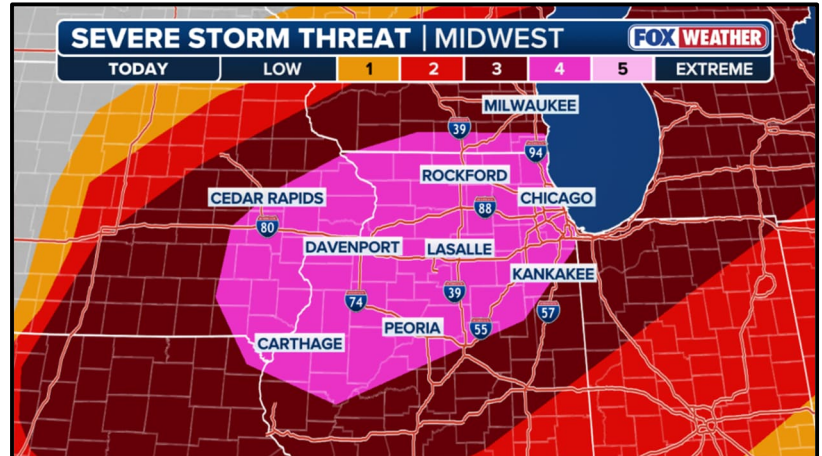

## Severe Storm Threat Midwest

- Millions across the Midwest face another round of dangerous severe weather Thursday, one day after a 350-mile derecho knocked out power to hundreds of thousands of people.
- While thunderstorms were ongoing across parts of Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana early Thursday, more powerful storms are expected to redevelop across the region during the afternoon.
- A Level 3 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms covers nearly 25 million people across a 600-mile corridor Thursday from eastern Missouri to northern Michigan, including Milwaukee and Chicago.
- Parts of eastern Iowa and northern Missouri are also covered by this Level 3 threat. A broader Level 2 threat covers Kansas City, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Detroit and Cleveland.
- Damaging wind gusts exceeding 70 mph will again be the most widespread hazard, but large hail and tornadoes are also possible, especially within supercell thunderstorms that develop.
- The greatest tornado risk sits just west of Milwaukee and Chicago and covers parts of southern Wisconsin, northwestern Illinois, eastern Iowa and northern Missouri.
- Additionally, these moisture-rich storms could bring the potential for low-end risk flash flooding, with widespread rainfall totals of 1 to 2 inches possible across Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois through Thursday night.



## Severe Weather Activity

- Severe weather devastated parts of Illinois, Wisconsin and Missouri on Wednesday as thunderstorms brought destructive wind gusts and heavy rainfall to the region.
- Authorities in all three states have reported significant storm damage, with wind gusts reaching up to 90 mph.
- In Missouri, a damaging tornado struck parts of the state, causing additional destruction.
- According to FOX Forecast Center, a derecho occurred, meaning a swath of damaging winds that is at least 250 miles long and 60 miles wide impacted the area.
- The derecho stretched over 350 miles, starting in Iowa and blasted through Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Indiana.
- According to PowerOutage.us, more than 270,000 customers in Illinois are without power, with Cook County among the hardest-hit areas. More than 189,000 customers in the county are experiencing outages.

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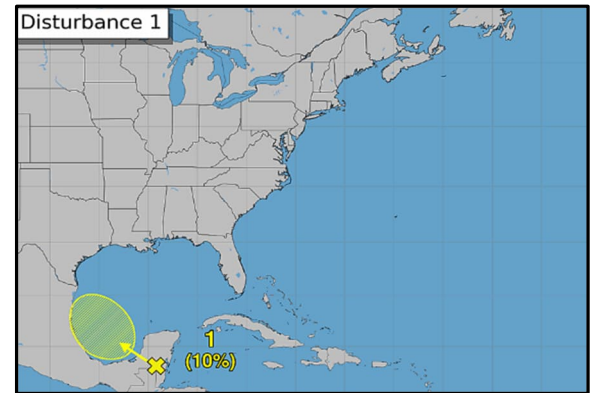
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- Meanwhile, more than 45,000 customers in Wisconsin are without power, and Michigan has roughly 130,000 power outages as of 9 p.m. during the storm's peak. Nearly half a million remained without power by Thursday morning.

## Tropical Activity – Atlantic

### Disturbance 1

- A broad area of low pressure is likely to form over the Bay of Campeche on Friday from a westward moving tropical wave.
- Currently located over the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico.
- Conditions are forecast to be only marginally conducive for development before the system moves inland over eastern Mexico late Saturday or Sunday.
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (10%)
- Formation chance through 7 days: Low (10%)



## 2026 Atlantic Hurricane Season Forecast – CSU Update

- Colorado State University (CSU) further reduced the number of storms it expects this Atlantic hurricane season in its updated seasonal forecast released on Wednesday.
- CSU cites increased confidence that a developing strong El Niño — which is typically associated with fewer named storms in the Atlantic — will become the dominant factor in determining tropical weather patterns this season, overcoming other forecast ingredients present that favor increased tropical development.
- The revised CSU forecast calls for 11 named storms, 5 hurricanes, including 2 major (Category 3+) hurricanes this year — down from its April forecast of 13 named storms and 6 hurricanes.
- This updated outlook is also in line with NOAA's seasonal forecast that was released several weeks ago.
