

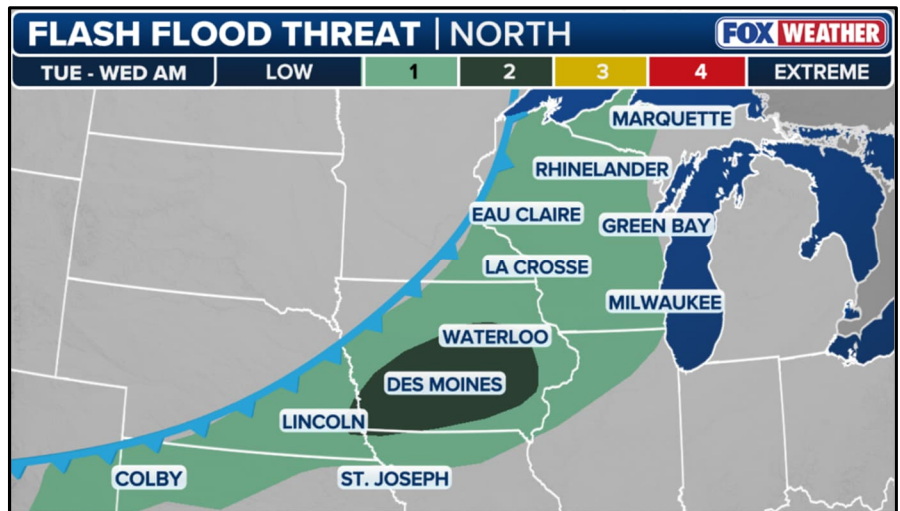

WSP USA FIELD SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

September 8, 2026

Flash Flood Threat Northern U.S.

- A powerful cold front will sweep across the Upper Midwest and central Plains on Tuesday, triggering strong to severe thunderstorms.
- Storms and rain will spread into the interior Northeast on Wednesday, with showers and rumbles of thunder possible from Kansas to Maine.
- By Thursday, the front will move south, bringing wet weather to the Mid-Atlantic, central Appalachians and Ohio Valley.
- Thunderstorms will continue Tuesday morning across parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin, bringing a risk of severe hail and wind gusts of 40 to 60 mph.
- The severe weather threat will increase during the evening across Iowa, eastern Nebraska and possibly northern Kansas as storms develop ahead of a slow-moving cold front.
- Storms could initially produce large hail and strong wind gusts before forming into lines, increasing the threat of damaging winds later Tuesday evening.
- The front will move slowly eastward, some areas could see multiple rounds of thunderstorms and flash flooding with Iowa faces the greatest flood threat, with a Level 2 of 4 risk in place.
- By Wednesday, thunderstorms will develop along the cold front from Upstate New York to the central Plains, a distance of about 1,000 miles.
- The strongest storms could produce wind gusts of 60 mph or more. Western New York could see a greater threat of severe weather if conditions become favorable.
- On Thursday, the storm threat shifts south with the front, focusing on the Mid-Atlantic, central Appalachians and Ohio Valley. Widespread severe weather is not expected, although a few storms could produce 50 to 60 mph wind gusts.
- Heavy rain and flooding will be the main concerns as tropical moisture moves north from the Gulf.
- A Level 2 of 4 flood risk is in place for parts of Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia, including flood-prone mountain and river valleys and urban areas from Pittsburgh south to Charleston.



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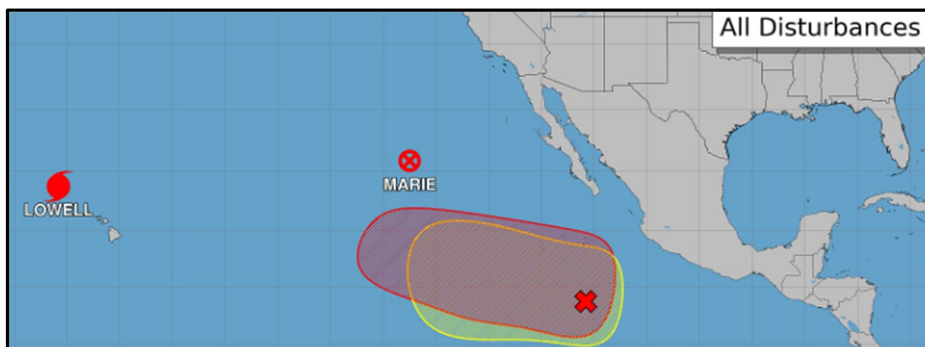
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Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific

Hurricane Lowell (CAT 2)

- Located 145 miles NW of Lihue, Hawaii moving N at 18 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds of 90 mph.
- Lowell is forecasted to turn toward the northwest and west and slow down on Wednesday and Thursday after passing the main Hawaiian Islands.
- Weakening is forecast, and Lowell should become a tropical storm later today and continue to weaken for the next couple of days.
- Hurricane-force winds extend outward up to 70 miles from the center and tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 230 miles.



Tropical Storm Marie

- Located 770 miles southwest of San Diego California moving WNW at 9 mph.
- Maximum sustained winds are near 40 mph (65 km/h) with higher gusts.
- Steady weakening is expected to continue, and Marie is forecast to dissipate in a couple of days.
- Tropical-storm-force winds extend outward up to 115 miles from the center.

Disturbance 1

- Showers and thunderstorms associated with a broad area of low pressure located several hundred miles SW of the southwestern Mexico are showing signs of organization.
- Gradual development is likely, and a tropical depression is expected to form later this week.
- Moving WNW at 10 to 15 mph.
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (20%): 7 days: High (70%)

Disturbance 2

- Area of low pressure is forecasted to develop several hundred miles south of the southern tip of Baja California this weekend or early next week.
- Slow development is possible as this system moves generally WNW.
- Formation chance through 48 hours: Low (0%): 7 days: Low (20%)
