WSP USA FIELD SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

August 6, 2026

Flash Flood Threat Eastern U.S.

- Millions of people across the Northeast and Ohio Valley face a flash flood risk through Sunday as oppressive humidity fuels rounds of daily thunderstorms across the already waterlogged region.
- The cold front that brought heavy rain and flooding across the Midwest is slowly shifting east.
- NOAA's Weather Prediction Center (WPC) issued a broad Level 1 out of 4 risk of flash flooding Thursday covering much of the Ohio Valley and interior Northeast, including Cleveland, Buffalo, New York, and Pittsburgh.
- Washington, D.C. and New York City are also included in this flood risk.
- NOAA's Storm Prediction Center (SPC) has issued a Level 1 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms Thursday across a corridor from the Mid-Atlantic to the interior Northeast including Washington, D.C., Scranton, Pennsylvania, as well as Syracuse and Albany, New York.
- Damaging wind gusts are expected to be the primary threat.
- Even stronger thunderstorms could erupt along the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic coasts on Friday as the cold front stalls across the eastern U.S.
- "Through the weekend, rainfall totals of 0.5-1 inch are likely across the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic, with localized amounts exceeding 1-2 inches where thunderstorms repeatedly move over the same locations," the FOX Forecast Center said.
- The flash flood threat extends across parts of the region through the weekend and those with outdoor plans will have to contend with rounds of rain.



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Wildfire Activity Washington

- Three major fires continue to burn around the Spokane, Washington, area, with more than 10,500 acres burned, zero containment, and more than 700 structures destroyed amid an ongoing wildfire emergency in the Pacific Northwest.
- The Autumn Lane Fire has crossed the Spokane River into the Indian Trail neighborhood, while the Old Trails Fire continues to spread northwest of the city.
- Fire officials said the Autumn Lane Fire remains their top priority, while nearly 65,000 people have been forced to evacuate since the Spokane Complex fires erupted.
- The Fairview Fire is burning northeast of Spokane and is threatening both neighborhoods and critical power infrastructure.
- The Spokane Valley Fire Department said it had 72 firefighters on duty Monday and is marked as one of the most destructive blazes in the states history.
- Over the weekend, strong winds, very dry vegetation, and rugged terrain fueled extreme wildfire conditions across the Spokane area.
- More than 10,500 acres have burned between the Old Trails, Autumn Lane and Fairview fires, with both the first two at 13% containment and Fairview at 5% contained, as fire crews from across the country continue to assist.
- No rain is expected in the extended forecast over the next 10 days, limiting relief for crews battling the fires.
- Gov. Bob Ferguson has declared a state of emergency and issued a burn ban through Sept. 30.



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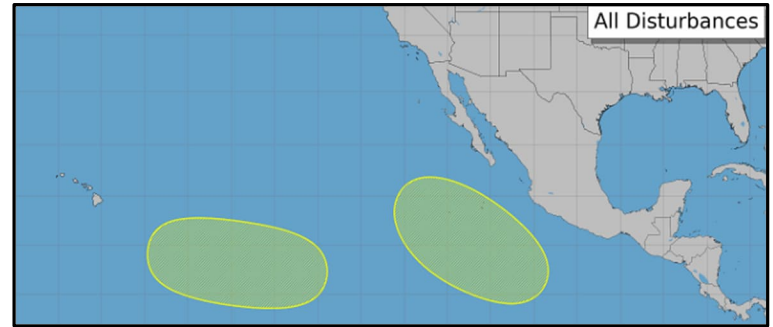
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Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific

Disturbance 1

- Located in the central portion of the east Pacific.
- Some gradual development of this system is possible.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (30%)



Disturbance 2

- An area of low pressure is forecasted to form well offshore of the southwestern coast of Mexico late this weekend or early next week.
- Gradual development of this system is possible thereafter while it moves generally west-north-westward.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (30%)
