

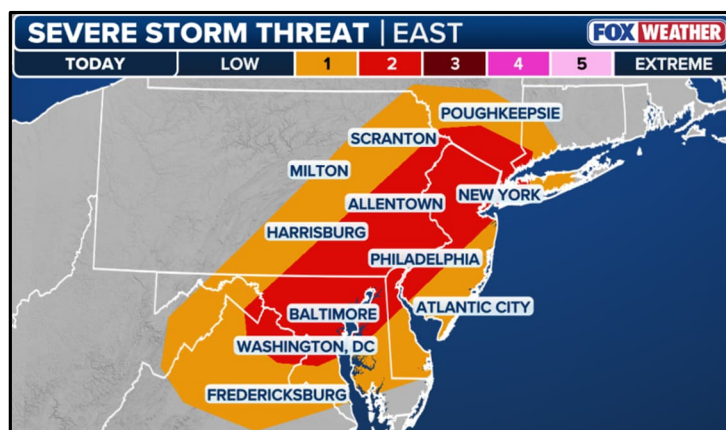

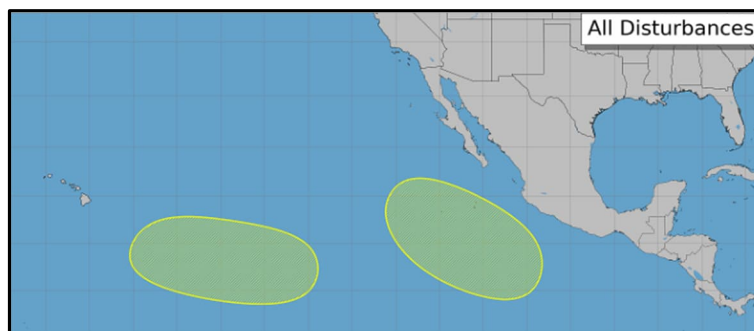
Severe Storm Threat Eastern U.S.

- Millions of people across the East Coast and Ohio Valley could see more strong thunderstorms Friday through Sunday, bringing pockets of torrential rain and a risk of flash flooding after storms swamped parts of the Northeast earlier this week.
- Beginning Friday afternoon, a cold front will stretch from the Great Lakes into the central Plains. This will increase instability and spark showers and thunderstorms from the Southeast into the Northeast.
- Rainfall rates could reach 2.5 inches per hour during the strongest storms.
- A Level 1 out of 4 flash flood risk is in place across much of the Northeast, Ohio Valley and Southeast through Saturday. This includes major cities such as New York City, Washington, D.C., Charlotte, and Atlanta.
- NOAA's Storm Prediction Center (SPC) has also issued a Level 2 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms beginning Friday afternoon across a corridor from the tip of southwestern Connecticut and New York's Lower Hudson Valley through eastern Pennsylvania and parts of New Jersey to the Delmarva.
- Residents across parts of the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic should expect widespread rainfall totals of 0.5 to 1 inch, with localized amounts of 1 to 2 inches or more where thunderstorms repeatedly track over the same locations through Saturday and Sunday.



Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific Disturbance 1

- Located in the western portion of the east Pacific.
- Some gradual development of this system is possible as it moves generally westward at 10 to 15 mph toward or into the central Pacific basin.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (30%)



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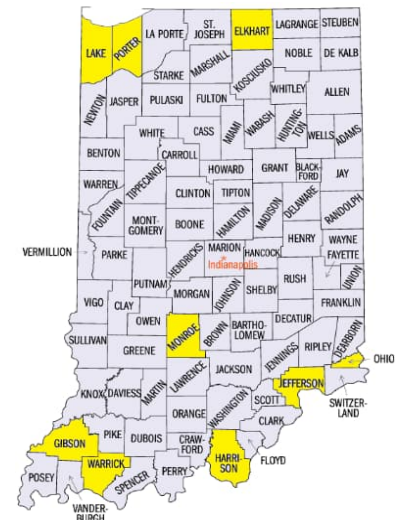
Disturbance 2

- Located well offshore of SW Mexico.
- Some gradual development of this system is possible thereafter while it moves generally WNW.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Low (30%)

Disaster Declaration Request

Indiana

- Indiana experienced a prolonged period of severe weather from June 6 through June 26, 2026, characterized by repeated rounds of severe thunderstorms, tornadoes, damaging straight-line winds, heavy rainfall, flooding, and a significant derecho.
- The event produced widespread impacts across the state and resulted in one of Indiana's most active tornado periods on record.
- Governor Mike Braun declared a state disaster emergency for 63 counties on June 19 following severe weather, flooding, tornadic activity, and the derecho that affected Indiana during the first half of the month.
- June 6–8 severe thunderstorms and heavy rainfall affected portions of Indiana, contributing to saturated soils and increasing the potential for subsequent flooding.
- During June 11–18 a powerful multi-day cluster produced destructive winds and intense tornadoes, including confirmed EF-3 damage in Porter and La Porte counties, alongside heavy tracks across Marshall, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Steuben, Huntington, and Cass counties. On June 11, Indiana experienced its most significant tornado outbreak of the month, with 27 tornadoes, including an EF-3 tornado in the northwest portion of the state.
- June 21–22 Outbreak a violent Mesoscale Convective System (MCS) and tornadic supercells targeted southern Illinois and southern Indiana, leading to high-end warnings, severe straight-line winds, and at least one confirmed fatality.
- Set a record pace for the state with nearly 50 confirmed tornado tracks.
- Widespread destructive straight-line winds exceeding 70–80 mph.
- Heavy downpours rates of 2+ inches per hour caused substantial flash flooding.
- On August 6, Governor Mike Braun requested individual assistance for 9 counties.
