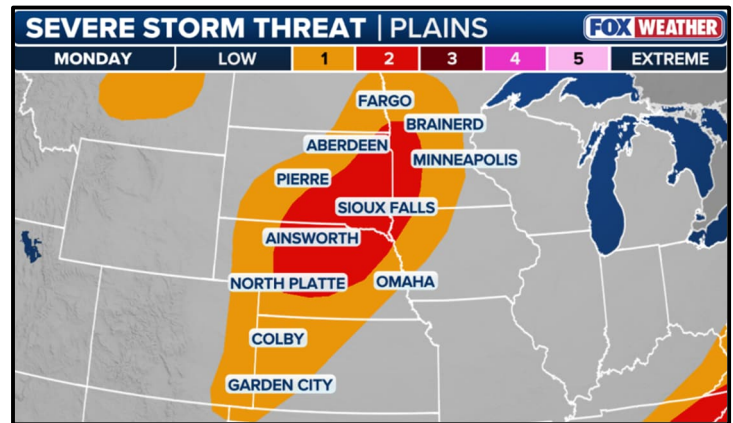

August 17, 2026

Severe Weather Outlook

Plains

- Another round of severe storms and heavy downpours target the Central Plains and Midwest as a multiday event takes shape to start the week, bringing renewed threats of damaging winds, hail, and isolated tornadoes alongside a persistent risk of flash flooding.
- The severe storm risk kicks off late Monday afternoon across eastern North Dakota, west-central Minnesota, and the Black Hills.
- The initial storms will bring a primary threat of hail, but as the evening progresses, activity will intensify and move southeast into a stronger, more unstable environment across Nebraska and southeast South Dakota.
- A Level 2 out of 5 severe storm threat has been issued as individual cells will cluster together into organized storm lines, bringing widespread damaging wind gusts.
- "A brief tornado cannot be ruled out as low-level winds strengthen into the evening," the FOX Forecast Center said.



Severe Weather & Flood Activity

Indiana

- A multiday onslaught of severe storms and historic flooding has left seven people dead and hundreds of structures impacted across Indiana, triggering widespread destruction, water rescues, mass power outages and imminent structural threats.
- Hamilton County officials said hundreds of structures have been impacted by the flooding. Authorities said their goal is now assessment, recovery and reconstruction.
- Flash Flood Emergencies were issued last Wednesday across east-central Indiana as torrential rainfall caused life-threatening flash flooding throughout the region.
- That flooding followed a destructive derecho on Tuesday, which the FOX Forecast Center confirmed brought 90 to 100 mph winds and stretched at least 250 miles long and 60 miles wide across northern Indiana.
- The National Weather Service reported that more than 11 inches of rain fell in parts of central Indiana over the course of two days.
- This caused the White River to surge, cresting near 25 feet in Anderson and Noblesville.
- The rising waters forced hundreds of evacuations across Delaware County, particularly along the river in Muncie.
- Indiana Governor Mike Braun declared a statewide disaster emergency Friday. On Saturday, President Donald Trump approved his request for a Presidential Emergency Declaration.

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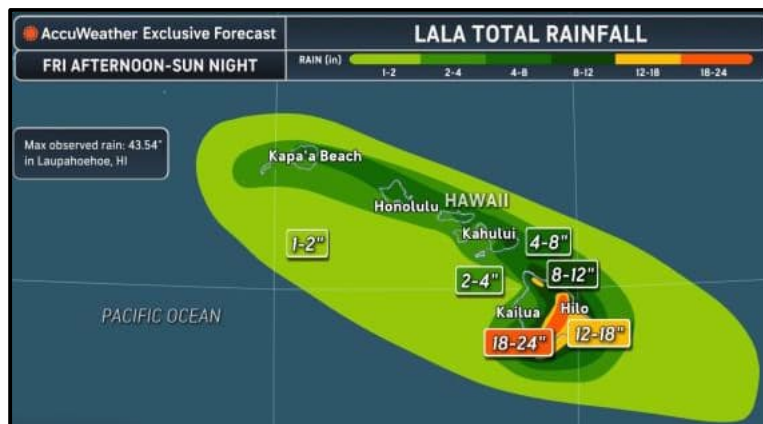
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Tropical Activity – Eastern & Central Pacific

Tropical Storm Lala - Hawaii

- On Saturday, Lala strengthened to a hurricane with the 3 p.m. ET advisory, 9 a.m. Hawaii time.
- But even though the eye of the storm passed a mere 30 miles off the rocky southern tip of Ka Lae on the Big Island during Saturday night, it still managed to bring 15-30 inches of rain to the Big Island, while strong winds cut power and monstrous waves reached the shoreline as pounding breakers.
- As of Sunday morning, wind gusts as high as 140 mph have been observed at the summit of Mauna Kea on the Big Island, where heavy snow and blizzard conditions were observed.
- Intermediate elevation gusts of up to 91 mph have been observed at Waimea on the Big Island and near 80 mph on Moloka'i.
- Lala knocked out power to more than 25% of utility customers statewide, with 65% without power on the Big Island. As of Sunday night, around 46% of customers remain without power across the Big Island.
- Torrential rain has pushed several area waterways into flood stage.
- The Wailuku River, which feeds Rainbow Falls and flows into Hilo, has reached its sixth-highest level on record.
- On top of the flooding, mudslides are a major concern as well.
- At least 100 homes were damaged and lost in the storm, Hawaii Gov. Josh Green said during a Sunday news conference.

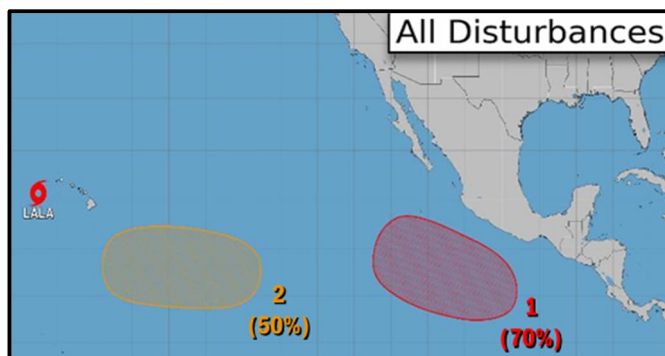


Disturbance 1

- Located several hundred miles south off the coast of Mexico.
- A tropical depression is likely to form by this weekend
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: High (70%)

Disturbance 2

- Could form well SE of the Hawaiian Islands.
- A tropical depression could form towards the end of this week or over the weekend.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Low (near 0%); 7-day: Medium (50%)
